NM Scientists Discover the Driver of Lupus

Lupus, a chronic autoimmune disease that causes inflammation and pain in your body, affects more than 1.5 million people in the United States.

With lupus, your immune system, which is meant to fight infections, attacks its own healthy cells and tissues.

Scientists at Northwestern Medicine have discovered an imbalance of a molecule in the blood that drives the harmful immune response in lupus. Restoring balance of this molecule in the blood may potentially cure the disease.

Until this study, the causes of lupus were unclear. The disease can cause life-threatening damage to your skin and joints as well as internal organs like your kidneys and heart. Existing treatments, which typically involve medication that stops your immune system from functioning (immunosuppression), can fail to control the disease and have an unintended side effect — reduction in the immune system's ability to fight infections.
